






The Importance of a Vibrant Downtown – from our perspective:

- 1. Serious investment in existing historic buildings including large scale investments in key buildings rather than small investments in many. These small investments actually preserve the status quo rather than encouraging building owners to bring their buildings back to their former splendor. It's disappointing that the funding from DEED went to new projects that have now had to turn back the money to the state.
- 2. Rebuild Bridge Square and investment in the downtown public spaces including a public bathroom facility. This is the living room of our community and it is in desperate need of rehabilitation for mobility and aesthetics.
- 3. Downtown special services district to support downtown businesses and building owners
- 4. Investment in new projects that will support the existing downtown, including structured parking, and new buildings and businesses such as hotels and restaurants. The Loon Liquor project is a great example but we need many more.
