The Butterfly: “Accidental Pollinator”

- Approximately 146 species in Minnesota, worldwide 20,000
- Lifestages: egg, larva, pupa and adult
 - Eggs are laid on Milkweed plants
 - Larva eat leaves of Milkweed, pupa attach to leaves
 - Adults emerge & seek out flower nectar for flight energy
- Lifespan: Adult, approximately one year
- Most common in Minnesota: Monarch
- Migration from Mexico to Minnesota can span five generations
- Attracted to: red, yellow, orange and purple flowers with flat petals to land or nap on, like Zinnia
- Called “accidental pollinator” because legs are not hairy
