#### Cannabis Law Changes



- Spring 2024 Staff began drafting amendments pursuant to MN Session Law Chapter 63, legalizing adult-use cannabis
- March 2025 State of Minnesota's Office of Cannabis
   Management closed applications for first round of licenses
- Two sections of code amendments:
  - Chapter 34 Land Development Code (Community Development)
  - Chapter 30 Health and Sanitation (City Clerk)

#### Cannabis Law Changes



- Under the State Law, local governments may register cannabis businesses and enforce certain zoning regulations within their jurisdiction, but they may not require additional licensing of cannabis businesses
- A local government unit may, by ordinance, limit the number of licensed cannabis retailers, cannabis mezzobusinesses with a retail operations endorsement, and cannabis microbusinesses with a retail operations endorsement to no fewer than one registration for every 12,500 residents
  - There is no upper limit or cap imposed by the State on the number of cannabis retail businesses but local ordinance may limit the maximums

# Policy considerations: City Legislative Code



## Chapter 30: Health, safety and sanitation

- City role:
  - Register businesses
  - Determine number
  - Oversight/control of underage use
  - Compliance

#### State role:

- Issue license types
- Enforcement/penalty
- Establish rules

### Chapter 34: Land development code

- City role:
  - Establish time, manner, place
  - Buffer/distance from schools etc.
  - Distance separation from similar uses
  - Appropriate zoning districts

#### State role:

- Establish license types
- Establish rules

## Policy considerations: Chapter 34



- Limit retail within 300 feet of: K-12 schools
- Separate cannabis retail from other cannabis retail by 1,320 feet
- Stand-alone retail allowed as a conditional use in C2 (highway commercial areas) and II (industrial areas)
- Full-stack facilities (eg; microbusiness and mezzobusiness) permitted by right in industrial areas and as conditional uses if greater than 15,000 square feet and/or in highway commercial areas

## Policy considerations: Future regulations



- Lower-potency hemp products
  - State in process of establishing new guidance
- Existing lower-potency hemp retailers
  - Intent in state rules for existing retailers to apply for state license
- Municipal adult-use cannabis dispensary (as an enterprise)



# Adult-use cannabis under the law



- Only sold to and by people 21+
- Can not smoke/vape near minors, including in residential settings
- Illegal to operate a motor vehicle while intoxicated/under the influence
- Can not serve alcohol to someone under the influence of cannabis (and vice versa)

# Adult-use cannabis: local control



- Penalties for violations proposing alignment of liquor/tobacco training, penalties, etc.
- Use restrictions (City already limits to the extent allowed – public places such as parks, right of way)
- Social host ordinance already includes cannabis based on last council update

# Municipal Option (further review not with ordinance update)



#### Municipal Option

- Separate from private licenses and does not count toward any minimum license required by State
- Staff continuing due diligence on providing analysis and Council policy considerations whether to consider this option or not
- Current Municipal Liquor Goals (for comparison alignment of "why" potentially consider municipal cannabis)
  - A. To control the sale of alcohol;
  - B. To supplement Traditional Tax & Fee Revenue;
  - C. To support the retail environment.

#### **Next Steps**



- Planning Commission recommend land development (zoning) code amendment April 17, 2025
- City Council hold first reading licensing amendment April 2025
- Cannabis ordinance(s) adopted June 2025
- State expects to issue licenses in 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter 2025
- Municipal cannabis and low-potency hemp considerations forthcoming from state
- Additional tobacco considerations (flavored, menthol, colocation with low-potency hemp products) forthcoming
