

Director's Report

These last few weeks I have been working to finalize the details of the grants from an anonymous donor via the Mpls Foundation to fund our Outreach Services initiative. There are three pieces to the grants; one provides for half of the purchase price of a new Bookmobile via a straight donation and a matching grant, one grant provides for a matching 1 to 1 funding for a bookmobile collection with grant dollars totaling up to \$5,000, and one grant provides for full funding for a part-time Outreach Coordinator position for a period of two years. I am presenting for City Council discussion on October 11 Council's acceptance of these grants, and asking for a commitment from the City for matching dollars from the CEP (Capital Equipment Plan) 2017 budget. By the time of this Library Board meeting that discussion will have taken place, and I will be able to give you all an update on the direction from the following week in support of the Council commitment would be appropriate, and appreciated.

We have made out last payment to our General Contractor and to our architects; our punch items issues have been resolved, and we are waiting on the arrival and invoicing of a few last purchases of furniture. We are still working actively with our architects on the graphics for the dedication plaque, with a local business on art signage, and a local sign-maker for Division Street exterior signage. The Contractor, Brennan Construction, and our architects, RoehrSchmitt Architects, have been responsive and helpful to work with throughout the project.

We have re-submitted a revised SEMAC grant application for the Poet Laureate of Northfield for consideration. This grant coverage would begin in November 2016, if awarded. Rob Hardy, Northfield's inaugural Poet Laureate, has jumped in with both feet, creating and participating in readings and civic events presence this fall.

Circulation Services

Resource sharing is a wonderful benefit of being a part of a large consortium of libraries. We belong to SELCO (Southeastern Libraries Cooperating) and that includes over 120 public, school and special libraries. They move about 3,500 items daily amongs the SELCO region. As for Northfield Public Library we receive between 8 – 15 bins of books each day in delivery. Each bin is opened and the contents removed and checked in. Some of the items are our items that are being returned and these are shelved. The rest are checked in, activiting the hold slip, and put on the hold shelf



for the patron. Although this whole process has become very automated, it still takes much staff time to pull the books to send, to wrap the books and get them ready for the delivery and unpacking the bins when they arrive. We used to have a staff person just dedicated to this responsibility, but a few years ago this was incorporated into the circulation staff responsibilities. Northfield patrons are prolific readers and they request a lot of books. In 2014 we borrowed 27,980 books from other libraries, in 2015 we borrowed 31, 364 and in the first 8 months of 2016 we have borrowed 23, 412. In most cases the books that are ordered are here within a few days. What a wonderful service for our patrons!
