National Library Week is this week, April 9-15, 2017. The theme is "Libraries Transform". First sponsored in 1958, National Library Week is a national observance sponsored by the American Library Association (ALA) and libraries across the country each April. It is a time to celebrate the contributions of our nation's libraries and librarians and to promote library use and support.

For us here in Northfield, it is also a time to say thank you. We have had a momentous year, beginning with our grand re-opening in May of 2016. Our patrons' feedback from the renovation has been overwhelmingly positive, and last fall we were honored to receive the WCCO Viewer's Best Library in MN award. The library remains a busy, vital City service, and we have close to 600 people a day come through our doors. We've got a new bookmobile being built, and a BookBike that you will see on the road promoting library services come this spring and summer, designed and built by Eric Johnson and his team of experts—thank you Eric! We thank the City of Northfield and the City Council for their support, from operating dollars to funding our capital renovation to the bookmobile. We also thank the Friends of the Library for their volunteer work on behalf of the library, for their financial support of the renovation, for their additional fundraising for the new bookmobile, and for their support for ongoing library programming such as Summer Reading and Books and Stars. We thank too the Library Board for their advocacy and for the hours they contribute to Board business and library planning. We thank the Ames Fund of the Mpls Foundation for their partial funding of the bookmobile, and to Northfield Rotary, United Way and Taylor Trucking for their bookmobile contributions as well. Thank you to the library staff for their great customer service, their obvious above and beyond work on behalf of the library, and for loving their jobs as much as they do. And most of all, thank you to the citizens of Northfield for their continued patronage through the years.

Hot Reads for Cold Nights concludes this weekend. The winter adult reading program has been very successful. Thirty two people are participating and contributing many slips summarizing the books they have read. Three readers win \$5.00 gift certificates each week. It is fun to call the winners, some of whom say "I've never won anything before!"

Jamie and I gave our monthly book talk at Three Links on February 28. We talked about humans and animals. I talked about fiction books focusing on people and pets or animals in their lives, and Jamie focused on nonfiction books about human and animals. I brought a number of classic children's books involving animals, and the participants really enjoyed seeing the books they had read growing up. The topic opened up discussion about pets the residents had had.

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Northfield Reads has four events scheduled for this month. The topic is mental illness, and the books is *Unholy Ghosts; writers on depression*, edited by Nell Casey. This week there is a speaker from the National Alliance for Mental Illness, talking about destigmatization. Next week the film Lars and the Real Girl will be shown at the Weitz Center. On March 23, I will be facilitating a book discussion at Content Books. The final event is March 30, and will include presentations by local mental health professionals, a short play, poetry, music and discussion. The goals of the presentation are to provide information about mental illness, the destigmatization of mental illness, and provide resources. I have been busy with a lot of planning, sending out PR, creating a Libguide, and interviews on KYMN.

The book group I lead, The Contemporary Women Writers Book group, has been meeting for twelve years. Lately we have had a number of new people joining the group. In February, we read

The Bad-Ass Librarians of Timbuktu and their race to save the world's most precious manuscripts.

When I'm not working on the above activities, I have been busy with reference questions and acquisitions for the fiction and romance collection.

Children's Services

The big news in Children's Services for March was the announcement of our new hire, Emily Lloyd, as the new Children's Programming Librarian. Emily's first day was Monday, March 20, and she hit the ground running. To illustrate my point, on her second day we met with Kathy Ness and Melissa Barnhard to write the grant that typically supports most of our ever-popular summer Books & Stars program. To finalize the grant, which was due the following week, Emily began researching performers and making arrangements to hire them for Wednesday evenings in June



and July. All this while trying to learn staff names and faces, planning weekly story times, and the Summer Reading Program! She has accomplished much in the short time she's been with us. I hope you make a point of seeking her out and meeting her on your next trip into the library.

The rest of March, my time was spent covering the Children's and Reference Desks, hosting the well-attended De-Cluttering Program, creating the monthly calendar and the rotating monitor power points, and planning the events celebrating National Library Week in April. I also spent one morning at the Northfield High School promoting the Summer City Internship position that we



will be hiring and I will oversee. This is one of 2 City internship positions available to persons ages 16-22 who would like experience with either the City's Street and Parks Department or the Public Library.

Emily Lloyd, Children's Programming Librarian

I started as the new Children's Programming Librarian on March 20, and much of my time the first week was in selecting and tentatively booking performers for Books & Stars, booking the parks and Showmobile, and finishing the grant for SEMAC. I streamlined the children's area by removing some items on the floor for storage, so that we can rotate items in and out---which will keep the items in good condition longer, declutter the space, and add excitement when "new" items children haven't seen for a while are reintroduced. I worked with Leesa and a local business, Ziggy's, to plan several days of events leading up to June's "Take a Child Fishing" day; submitted a small grant in the hopes of receiving 200 pairs of eclipse-viewing glasses for August's eclipse; planned programs that will be held in May (a Saturday storytime and a Hamilton Sing-Along); evaluated and began work on revamping the subject guides related to children's and teen services; and began planning in earnest for the summer reading program, themed "Build a Better World." Most importantly, I've worked to make connections with local families in the library.

Web

The site continues to have a strong presence online, getting nearly 10,000 page views in March. Our most popular page last month was the new Poet Laureate page put together by Rob Hardy. I strongly encourage you to check it out. He's done a fantastic job. The next most popular were the events page, kids, and databases. One fun fact about last month is that we had a user access the site from their Playstation 3 on the Safari browser. It's good to see that our attempts at targeting the 13-25 gamer demographic are starting to pay off!

Tech

Lastly, the tech program continues on steadily. We're getting approximately four or five applications a week and doing roughly that many sessions. David, Steve, and I are handling the bulk of them. Last month we worked with kindles, iPads, iPhones, an unruly laptop or two, and video editing software. I encourage you to let anyone you know who needs a little tech help to check us out!

Shelving and Volunteer Services

On March 24th, I presented a program at Northfield Retirement Program about our Homebound Delivery Program. Seventeen residents attended the program. They asked questions and were excited to learn more about our service. I issued 6 new library cards and enrolled 4 of this people in our Homebound Delivery Program. I requested material for three people to be delivered. Since the presentation, I have had two more residents contact me to be enrolled.

After my presentation, I was asked questions about downloadable E-books and audiobooks. I have offered to schedule one-on-one appointments to give hands-on instruction on these resources. I have done one such tutorial, teaching a resident how to request materials from her lpad. That session and the questions brought up at my presentation, have prompted me to begin to develop more presentations to promote access to library materials and resources to area seniors.

Circulation Services

Kathy Ness came to us with an idea that she had seen online called "Boomerang Bags". We have volunteers make book bags using recycled fabric. Patrons can grab a bag when they check out, and bring it back when they return their materials. This will reduce our use of the SELCO plastic bags that are costing us \$1.00 a bag. We

organized four sewing bee's where we had fabric cut out and ready to go – however we didn't have many people show up. So we put together kits of material for 4-6 bags with everything you need including instructions. Our handy Patrons are taking them home, completing them and bringing them back. We have about 150 bags out being made and we have received about 50 back to the library. We just started putting them out for the public. We plan to have another round of bag making later in the summer.

Youth Poetry Night at Content (March 2), featuring Arcadia Charter School Poetry Out Loud winners Anna Kochevar and Bella Callery, TORCH Poetry Slam winner Alondra Pérez, and high school student Hannah Pahs. Attendance: 15. The following week, Anna and Bella advanced to the state Poetry Out Loud Finals, and Anna was chosen as Minnesota's State Poetry Out Loud Champion.

Poetry Workshops with Guante (March 28). The Poet Laureate provided funding from the SEMAC grant to host a series of poetry workshops at Northfield High School with two-time National Poetry Slam champion Guante. The workshops were organized by Jennifer Lompart, ELL teacher at Northfield High School. Attendance: 60 high school students.

Poet Laureate LibGuide. The Poet Laureate created a LibGuide (website) as part of the Northfield Public Library site (URL: guides.mynpl.org/PoetLaureate). The site includes information about the Poet Laureate position, a calendar of poetry events, monthly reports, a list of local poets, a blog, and copies of poems written by the Poet Laureate for public occasions. The Poet Laureate published two blog posts and updated the events calendar.

ARTZANY! On March 31, the Poet Laureate was a guest on Paula Granquist's radio program on KYMN, *ArtZany! Radio for the Imagination,* along with Anna Kochevar, Bella Callery, and Scott Grave (Arcadia Charter School). The Poet Laureate presented a list of upcoming poetry events, talked about Poetry Out Loud, and read a poem from his new book.

Sidewalk Poetry Judging. On March 28, the Poet Laureate served as a judge for the 2017 Northfield Sidewalk Poetry Competition.
