# Challenges facing women in the US today



#### **National Numbers**

1 in 4 college women will be sexually assaulted.

5.3 million incidents of intimate partner violence occur each year among women 18 and older.

1 in 4 women have been victims of severe physical violence by an intimate partner.



#### **National Numbers**

**Every 9 seconds**, a woman in the US is assaulted or beaten.

Women constitute 65% of the victims of murder-suicides in the US.

1 in 7 women have been stalked by an intimate partner during their lifetime.

1 in 10 women have been raped by an intimate partner.



#### **Minnesota Numbers**

684,000 Minnesota women will be raped, stalked, or experience violence by an intimate partner in their lifetimes.

In 2020, nearly 70,000 victims received services from domestic violence agencies in Minnesota.

There were 22,760 active protective orders between 2006 and 2015.

Law enforcement conducted 401 sex trafficking investigations in 2017. 20% were in southern Minnesota.

#### **Northfield Numbers**

2,678 Rice County residents reported being in an abusive relationship in 2019.

Hope Center had 161 sexual violence cases in 2018 and 442 between 2016 and 2018. 86% of those victims were female.

At least 74 people were sexually assaulted at Carleton College and St. Olaf College in 2019.



#### Women's Numbers - Elected Office

Women in the US Senate EVER, since 1789: 58. 2.9%.

Today: 24; 24%.

Women in the US House EVER: 345. 2.8%.

Today: 118; 27%.

Women in state legislatures, total today: 31%.

Women in the Minnesota Legislature today: 36%.

- 1. Substantive Equality
- 2. Non-Discrimination



#### What is CEDAW?

### 6 Parts, 30 Articles.

I – *Overview*: equality in political, social, economic, and cultural spheres.

2 - Equality in political and public spheres.

Right to vote; participate in government; acquire, change, or retain nationality.



3 – Equality in education, employment, health.

4 – Equality in civil matters – contracts, rights of residence, right to enter or dissolve marriage and to freely choose a spouse.










